It is amazing to me that Monroe County can praise itself for contracting with animal control shelters that have high kill rates.

In 2015 the Humane Animal Care

Coalition of the Upper Keys killed 7.5 out of every 10 cats that were brought to them and 3.2 of every 10 dogs. That's right, and this is their "reduced" numbers from previous years. Florida Keys SPCA is right behind them in the kill numbers. No wonder people who cannot keep a pet would rather turn them to the streets than take them to the

The shelter three-day rule is very disturbing. Imagine if your cat/dog had a caretaker that accidentally let it escape over a long weekend when you were out of town. Your pet loses its collar, is caught by a stranger, transported in an unfamiliar vehicle and finds itself at one of the kill shelters. Would your animal purr or wag its tail? Most likely
